

After the Orders Stop

A Home Conversation for Military Retirement



For years, military families have learned how to move.

Consideration	What to Think About
The Real Monthly Cost	Mortgage, taxes, insurance, utilities, HOA fees, repairs, and maintenance all add up
Health & Access	Proximity to doctors, specialists, VA care, pharmacies, hospitals, and daily errands
Layout	Stairs, large yards, driveways, and high-maintenance features may feel different over time
Community	Do you want military familiarity, a fresh start, quiet, or activity?
Family Expectations	Talk through boundaries, distance, caregiving, visits, and independence
Resale Value	Even a "forever home" should make sense if life changes

what comes next.

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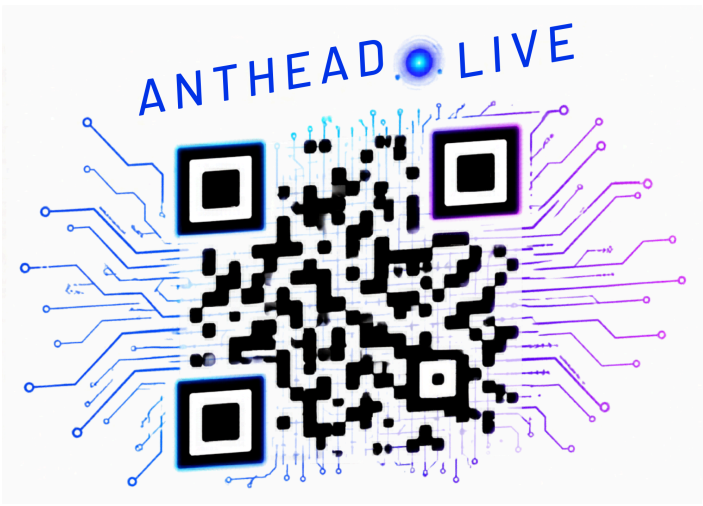
